This is an unusually heavy dinar of Kumaragupta I, whose basic standard was in the 7.80-8.10g range, though a few of his dinars have been published in the 8.30-8.55 range, such as this piece. Dinars of Kumaragupta II are known with weights in the 8.97-9.40g. Sanjeev Gupta concluded that the dinar weight was increased very late in reign of Kumaragupta I to the 8.30-8.60g range, which was then adopted by his immediate successor Skandagupta, who later in his reign increased the weight to the 9.00-9.40g range. Dinars of the heavy weight late issue of Kumaragupta I are very rare.

After Akbar introduced the Ilahi Era coinage in the 32nd year of his reign, most coins bore the mint name, the Ilahi year and starting in his 35th year, the month according to the solar calendar. This was continued on many coins of his successor Jahangir, but in his 13th year (=AH1027), he replaced the name of the month by its constellation symbols.

At first, this policy was applied to both the silver, struck at Ahmadabad, and the gold coinage, struck at Agra. All these coins bear the name Jahangir, the mint and the Hijri year on one side, the zodiacal symbol and the regnal year on the other. This was introduced in his year 13, during the Hijri date 1027, for both silver & gold. Whereas the gold continued to be produced through AH1034, the silver rupees were struck for only five months, indicated by the ram, bull, gemini, crab and lion, in that order, of which the bull & lion are relatively available, the other three rarer.

One reason for the rarity of the silver and gold zodiac pieces is that they were recalled from circulation following the death of Jahangir. According to a report from the French 17th century traveller Jean Baptiste Travernier, use of the zodiac rupees thereafter was punishable by death!

However, by far the rarest of all the silver are the half rupees. There are no examples recorded on CoinArchives and only one on Zeno, #139936, the bull (taurus), an example in the Ashmolean Museum, also struck from dies prepared for the full rupee, and like this example, on a thin planchet intended for the half rupee. The KM catalog also lists the zodiac half rupee for Ahmadabad, the bull (KM-138.1, possibly the Ashmolean specimen), and the lion (KM-138.2, not illustrated). There are none in British Museum catalog or any of the other major museum catalog in our library.

An Exceedingly Rare 1/4 Mohur Nisar of Aurangzeb. Presumably Unique!

Gold nisar largesse coins of Aurangzeb are exceedingly rare. Only a half mohur of Shahjahanabad is listed by the Standard Catalog of World Coins (KM-A307.1), and none are recorded on CoinArchives (just one gold nisar on CoinArchives, but of Shah Jahan I).

The obverse legend, although partly off flan, is the standard nisar legend of Aurangzeb. "alamgir padshah ghazi", without his royal title "Aurangzeb", with regnal year and mint name on the reverse, also with the mint epithet on this piece.

The Standard Catalog of World Coins lists a quarter mohur, only for the mint of Bijapur (KM-309.1), but listed as a standard mohur type, not as a nisar, thus presumably with the standard full royal legend on the obverse. The only quarter mohur recorded on CoinArchives also bears the traditional full royal obverse legend, thus not a standard nisar piece (Burhanpur mint, AH1090 year 23).

It seems that this piece is unique. This is surely an opportunity to acquire one of the greatest rarities of the reign of Aurangzeb, a fighting chance that may not again be available for many decades!

NOTE: The mint is incorrectly cited on the slab as Akbarabad, and without the term "nisar". This can easily be corrected upon request.

The VS1843 mohur was not struck for circulation, but was almost certainly a special piece ordered by Ghulab Singh Bhangi, the seventh chief of Bhangi Misl, for presentation to a chief official or to a member of his own family; perhaps for his wife, Mai Sukhan. It was produced from the same dies used for the silver rupee, and the actual production was limited to a very small group, probably just the nine examples attached to this necklace (the ninth piece was removed earlier and was sold in our Auction 30, Lot 2547. Unlisted by both Herrli and Gurprit Singh, it is of the same type as the silver rupees of type Singh-01.05 and 01.09, respectively. The mounting proves that these mohurs were made to be worn, in this case attached to a neckless worn by the receiver. Thus they served the same function as a nazarana mohur.

It is said that Maharaja Ranjit Singh was infatuated by a courtesan named Moran (literally meaning "peacock") who wanted coins to be minted in her name. Since it was not possible to put her name on the coins, the calligraphers inscribed the image of the peacock on the coins in a clandestine manner. So much so that for nearly 200 years the people called these coins as Morashahis (even which did not carry the image of the peacock on them) without actually being able to see the peacock on them till it was brought to light a few years ago by Gurprit Singh in one of his articles published in the JONS (Journal of Oriental Numismatic Society, London).

From as early as 1806 the East India Company had hoped to achieve a single currency for all of its Indian Presidencies. This was achieved in 1833 when the rupees of Bengal moved into line with those of Madras and Bombay. After some experimentation in 1834, by Act XVII of 17 August 1835 the Company moved forward towards a uniform coinage, not only of weight standard but also of design. Under the new system the silver rupee was legal tender. The gold double mohur and mohur coins, although initially passing at 30 and 15 rupees, were to float in terms of the rupee according to the metal market. The gold coins were not legal tender. Production at Calcutta began in 1835 and continued into 1836 (with the date frozen). However the relative value of gold and silver at that time meant the the mint made a loss on gold coin production so the mintage was low.

The two medals above were among the first medals issued by the Society Promoting Arts and Commerce commemorating historical events. The Nawab of Bengal, Siraj-ud-daula, had gone into camp at Plassey, anticipating the arrival of the English army. By the end of the confrontation Siraj-ud-daula had been captured. His body was divided into pieces and paraded through the city of Murshidabad on an elephant. One of the former Nawab's commanders, Meer Jaffar, was then placed on the throne.


