 ATTICA: Anonymous, 440-404 BC, AR tetradrachm (17.20g), Athens, S-2526, helmeted bust of Athena right // owl standing right with head facing, olive spray and moon behind, bold strike, Strike: 3/5, Surface: 4/5, NGC graded Choice AU \$600 - 800

Quantities of tetradrachms were minted to pay for such projects as the rebuilding of the city's temples, to finance new buildings such as the Parthenon, and to fund the Peloponnesian War, which was to ruin Athens financially.

Born to Marcus Agrippa and Julia the Elder, Caius Caesar and Lucius Caesar were adopted by Augustus as joint-heirs. This coin commemorates their appointment as designated consuls and first among the youth. Neither, however, would outlive their grandfather and sit on Rome's throne.

 BYZANTINE EMPIRE: Justinian II, First reign, 685-695, AV solidus (4.34g), Constantinople, S-1248, bust of Christ Pantocrator facing; cross behind // Emperor standing facing, wearing crown and loros, holding cross potent set on two steps, and akakia; minor reverse die cracks, lovely lustrous surfaces, strike: 5/5; surface: 3/5, NGC graded Choice AU, ex Triskeles Sale 29, Lot 321 \$3,800 - 4,000

This coin is notable for being the first coin type to depict Jesus Christ, and was a direct result of the Trullan Synod, called by Justinian in 692. Canon 82 of the Synod made allowance for representing Christ in His human guise rather than symbolically as had been done hitherto.

### **An Extraordinary Tremissis of Cunincpert**





LOMBARDS: Cunincpert, 688-700, AV tremissis (1.17g), Pavia, MEC 1 —, Arslan-31, cf. Bernareggi-12, struck ca 688-692, diademed bust of the king right, RX below, DN CVN-INCPE // victory standing with head left, holding wreath and globus cruciger, + DN CVNINCPERT REX I (all N's retrograde), VF-EF, RRR

King of the Lombards and King of Italy, Cunincpert (Cunipert) was the son of Perctarit and a member of the Bavarian dynasty. He oversaw the coinage reform which abandoned the Byzantine Victory motif in favor of the archangel Saint Michael, a venerated figure among the newly converted Lombards due to his association with the pagan god Odin. This coin belongs to the much rarer pre-reform transitional type, which explicitly names the king rather than the Byzantine emperor (cf. Lot 32 of this sale) and yet still retains the Victory reverse. Only a handful examples of this type have ever appeared in auctions, and none as well preserved (cf. CNG Auction 100, Lot 391).



The city of al-Daybul was abandoned by the 13th century, and was located at a site known as Bhambore. The ruins of the original mosque, built by order of the governor of Sind, Muhammad b. Qasim, contained an inscription dated the equivalent of 727 (AH108/109), some 16 years after the Arab conquest of the town. The site is now a national historic park, about 4 km west of the town of Gharo. The modern Port Qasim is located about halfway between Karachi and Gharo, and was also named after Muhammad b. Qasim (about 1972). The river beach within the historic park is known as Debal Beach.

From the consignor: Whatever its ancient history is, the port has considerable significance in Islamic and Arab History due to the fact that pirates who had seized Arab ships sailing between Lanka and Basra were launched from the port of Daybul. Arab conquest of Sind under Muhammad bin Qasim was a consequence of that incident and the refusal of the Sind ruler to pay reparations. Daybul was founded in the 1st century CE, and at one point in time an important trading city in Sindh. During Abbasid rule stone structures including a city wall and a citadel were built, but an earthquake in 893 AD reportedly destroyed the port city of Daybul. The port of Daybul had immense significance in trade since the 8th Century CE onwards. It was an important port for export of indigo pink salt (a product of the sub-continent) which was used in medicines and textiles and it was the port from whence silk and other Chinese products were exported to Arabia, Abyssinia and Egypt. Thus it was linked with the ancient Silk Road. Ships taking those products would move up the Persian Gulf hugging the Persian coast till Basra and on the return trip would bring down Damascene steel products, particularly swords, lances and body armor pieces.

Similar ships would travel down the African coast up to Zanzibar or hugging the coast of Red Sea up to Egypt. Silver coins from the mint of Daybul are extremely rare and so far

only dirhams dated 95 AH are known. In the Mughal period of Akbar very rare rupees were issued from the same town Dewal Bandar.

However the copper Fals dated 117 AH is a new discovery. Copper coins are much less preserved than other metals and particularly in the moist and salty environment of Daybul port city. This specimen is a testament to Arab rule over the area until the date of issuance of this coin.

This type has the Quranic verse 9:34 which admonishes those who hoard gold and silver without spending it in a godly manner, first used on the multiple dirhams of the Samanids and their rivals in the late 10th century. Struck only at Tetuan in 1195, either on a broad flan of about 39mm or a narrow and thicker flan of about 32-34mm, of equal rarity. Both this and the earlier type (A-591/592) probably failed because they weighed about 8% more than the already circulating Spanish-American 8 reales silver coins and likely many were melted down for their silver.
